CARRY-ON LUGGAGE GUIDE (International Travel Only)



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Many tourists choose to bring carry-on luggage with them when traveling abroad since the cost is included in the booking. However, because carry-on luggage size varies from airline to airline, it's often confusing for travelers to figure out what size luggage to fly with.

Most airlines charge around \$30/\$35 for the first checked bag, with a second bag costing between \$45 and \$50. To avoid paying a costly fee for overweight luggage, you'll need to plan, and that includes knowing what kind of carryon bag is acceptable on your airline of choice.

The Exact Size of Carry-On Luggage

The dimensions of the standard domestic carry-on luggage size are 22" x 14" x 9" (with a maximum linear size of 45 inches) or 56 x 35 x 23 centimeters, including the handle and the wheels. However, luggage size can vary from airline to airline and can be different for international flights.

Be sure to measure the height of your luggage from the floor to the top of the handle in its lowered position (wheels included). Depth is measured from front to back and width is measured from side to side.

Weight restrictions for carry-on luggage can also vary according to the airline you are flying with. For example, Aer Lingus and Icelandair only allow carry-on bags up to 22 pounds (10 kgs), while Play Airlines restricts carry-on luggage at 26 pounds/12 kg. All the others mentioned in this guide do not have specific weight restrictions on carry-on baggage. However, it is a given that your carry-on must fit in the overhead bin.

In this guide, you'll find the carry-on specifications for carry-on luggage on transatlantic flights from North America to Ireland.

What are Considered Personal Items?

If you are traveling with children, you may take a stroller to the door of the airport, where airport staff will store it for you.

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The Carry-On Luggage Features to Consider

When choosing carry-on luggage, there are different styles to consider. That includes hard- and soft-sided luggage.

Hard-sided luggage is best if you are carrying breakable items. This type of luggage also offers better security because it doesn't have outside pockets or zips that can be easily accessed by thieves. The inside has some organizational features that are like packing cubes, perfect for the Type A traveler. Hard-sided luggage is, however, more expensive.

Soft-sided carry-on luggage is cheaper and lighter, is more flexible and can conform to tight spaces. The expandable nature of soft-sided luggage is that you can pack more than you expected, although be aware of your airline's weight restrictions. Exterior and interior pockets are great for including last-minute items.

Wheeled luggage is a must if you're traveling long distances and especially if you are bringing a carry-on bag through the airport. There are different types, but four-wheelers seem to be the easiest to handle because each wheel swivels 360 degrees, meaning you won't have to drag your luggage, and that means less strain on your body.

What Can You Put into Your Carry-on Luggage?

While firearms, lithium batteries and other hazardous items are forbidden in carry-on and checked-in luggage, there are other restrictions that you should know about.

They include specific restrictions on various types of liquids that are not allowed in carry-on bags. No containers of liquids, pastes, aerosol, gels, or creams larger than 3.4 ounces (100 ml) are allowed through security.
